2. BACKGROUND

- I have been working since the age of 14.
- I have held a variety of jobs ranging from administration to bartending, in South Africa as well as overseas.
- Upon my return to South Africa due to Covid-19, I discovered that jobs were in high demand and low availability.





- I joined Stimela Marine & General shortly after my return and started out as an Administrator.
- After a month, I was made permanent and promoted to Surveyor.





3. EXPERIENCES

- The nerves will always be there when going out – the trick is to understand why and prepare yourself.
- You can't be scared. Ask those questions, climb that ladder, get your hands dirty. No-one is going to give you appraisal/gold medal unless you've earned it.
- Best way to prepare is to know where and why you're going somewhere. Have your checklists, goals and questions ready.





- My first Survey the "sweet" start: inspecting oranges in my orange "dress" of a reflective vest.
- I have inspected many types of cargo, and investigated many matters now.
- Finding the right shoe! PPE is a very important factor and finding it all in my size can be a challenge!

- I had to adapt, rise to the challenge and so I began to "learn on the job".

- What I have, do and will face


- So much PPE does not cater to the female body.

The Port of Durban:

- The first time I went to the Port of Durban was to inspect a machine.
- There are a lot of moving parts I was warned to keep an eye out for.
- When we walked onto the loading dock, all the moving parts stopped and all I hear is Lance muttering under his breath – "why doesn't this happen when I'm here?".





Container Inspection:

- We attended to an inspection of a Container that was infested with worms, mould and smelled so bad, not even the workers would go in.
- When Lance jumped up into the Container, no-one batted an eyelid.
- When I jumped in, everyone was in shock and someone even asked me: "Are you actually going in there?"

8. WOMEN IN THE INDUSTRY


Women Seafarers:

I stay because:


- I enjoy what I do every Survey is different, no matter the similarities to others so every day is a challenge.
